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## LESSONS LEARNED

- The profile update process occurred online due to the covid 19 pandemic. This resulted in no investment in travel for meetings and/or workshops which is a good lesson learned for future processes that do not have sufficient funding for meetings.
- The composition of the profile update team should include a person who will be in charge of the GIS during the entire process.
- It is important to include within the updating team a professional copy editor who is a native English speaker and another who is a native Spanish speaker.

## SUSTAINABILITY/REPLICATION

- 100% online process with broad participation of experts from the prioritized Hotspot countries.
- Participation of professionals from the prioritized countries who have knowledge of the reality of the territories.
- It was important to have a professional who led the technical team and another who was in charge of the logistical and administrative aspects.
